What is COVID-19?

COVID-19 is a respiratory illness caused by a novel (*new*) Coronavirus. The disease it causes has been named "Coronavirus Disease 2019" (COVID-19). Please remember, the risk to residents of South Carolina remains low at this time.

Stopping the spread of the virus through everyday practices is the best way to keep people healthy. Symptoms may range from mild to severe and are similar to a cold or influenza. They In addition to monitoring both the spread of COVID-19 and include fever, cough, and shortness of breath.

Who is at risk?

Of the current known cases, children appear to be the least at risk. Those most at risk are the elderly, immunocompromised, or adults with certain pre-existing conditions. Is COVID-19 active in South Carolina?

What is MCSD is doing to prepare for possible COVID-19 cases?

According to guidance given by the CDC, in communities like ours, where COVID-19 is NOT active, the most important • thing for school districts to do now is plan and prepare.

MCSD considers steps that would be taken to control the outbreak, in concert with governmental agencies such as the • DHEC and the CDC, and provide continuity of service to students.

How will MCSD respond if there is a local outbreak?

The stepped response found in the MCSD Emergency Plan is meant to correspond to the seriousness of a local outbreak. Educational responses may range from:


- increased communications about keeping symptomatic students home;
- to coordinated student handwashing and increased cleaning of hard surfaces such as doorknobs and desks;
- to cancellation of extra-curricular events;
- up to and including school closure.

Should a case of coronavirus be confirmed by DHEC among our students or staff, MCSD will immediately notify all parents and provide recommendations and next steps. In any situation, such as a community-wide quarantine that required the closure of all schools for more than just a few days, MCSD would make every effort to continue providing educational programming in an age-appropriate manner. Doing so is important to maintain learning and to provide students with a sense of normalcy and a positive focus during a stressful situation.

What is MCSD doing now in response to the spread of **Coronavirus?**

any recommendations by the CDC, here are the steps MCSD is taking to prepare for this possible emergency. Please remember, the risk to residents of South Carolina remains low at this time.

- Reviewing our Emergency Operating Plans
- Monitoring field trip destinations to ensure students are not traveling to or through cities experiencing an outbreak (as defined by the CDC)
- Reminding students and staff about respiratory etiquette and handwashing
- Reminding parents to keep students at home who have • symptoms of a respiratory illness
- Developing information-sharing systems specific to this potential outbreak with other organizations and governmental agencies
- Monitoring absenteeism and notifying local health officials about large increases in student or staff absences
- Strengthening procedures to isolate and send home • students and staff who are sick at school as soon as symptoms present
 - Enhancing existing environmental cleaning (MCSD uses products proven effective in killing *coronaviruses*)
 - Creating communications plans specific to the potential outbreak for use with the school community (like this one)

If you have recently traveled to an area that has COVID-19 transmission and are experiencing symptoms mentioned below, call ahead to your health care provider before seeking medical care.



What is it?

- A new respiratory virus first identified in Wuhan, China
- It has the potential to cause severe illness and pneumonia in some people

How is it spread?





Through the air by coughing and sneezing

Close personal contact, such as touching or shaking hands



Touching an object or surface with the virus on it, then touching your mouth, nose, or eyes

What are the symptoms?

Illnesses can be mild, or in some cases be severe enough to require hospitalization. Symptoms of this respiratory illness primarily include:



Fever

Cough



Shortness of **Breath**

How is it prevented?

Similar to prevention of other respiratory illnesses, including the flu:

- Wash hands often
- Avoid touching eyes, nose, or mouth with unwashed hands
- Avoid contact with sick people
- Stay home while you are sick; avoid others
- Cover mouth/nose with a tissue or sleeve when coughing or sneezing
